Accreditation vs Certification

Not all certificates are equal. You need to make sure your certificate is from a Certification Body that has been accredited by the government-recognised United Kingdom Accreditation Service (UKAS).

The terms certification and accreditation are ofter used together. Despite the obvious confusion this can cause, the difference between the two can be easily explained.

Certification represents a written assurance by a third party, of the conformity of a product, process or service to specified requirements.

The UKAS is the national accreditation body for the UK. Its role is to assess organisations that are providing testing, inspection, calibration, and certification services (collectively known as conformity assessment bodies) against internationally recognised standards.

Businesses have seen many staff working from home, however, with the vaccination programme and Government pathways in place, many organisations can now look forward to welcoming more of their staff back to the workplace.


There have been many Legislative updates in the UK since the start of the pandemic, which can be confusing due to the many changes to any guidance.

- Coronavirus (Scotland) (No.2) Act 2020 (asp 10)
- Public Health etc. (Scotland) Act 2008 (asp 5).

Risk Assessments

One of the changes that has resulted from Brexit, is the requirement for a UK specific marking, for certain manufactured goods, that are to be sold in the UK market. The UKCA (UK Conformity Assessed) marking, is a new UK product marking that covers most goods which previously required the CE marking. It also applies to aerosol products that previously required the 'reverse epsilon' marking. The UKCA marking came into effect on 01/01/2021 but the use of the CE mark is allowed until 01/01/2022.
